



Before I discuss goals 4, 5 and 6 for this year, let me say a few words about the Hoo-Hoo enthusiasm that is growing within our Order! It's almost unbelieveable how cooperative and helpful a lot of our members have become. All of our S-9's have pledged to start or reactivate a total of 13 clubs this year. In addition to this, many clubs are initiating a record number of kittens. The quality of these kittens insure the future of our Order because many are in the age bracket of 25 to 35 and should be around for a long time. Couple this with many clubs adopting a balance of good programming, and we have the ingredients needed for growth and success. The willingness of clubs to schedule meetings for my convenience has also been most helpful. Hoo-Hoo people are the greatest!

Goal No. 4 for this year is to have Hoo-Hoo listed in the encyclopedias. I'm happy to report that 12 such publishers have been contacted and thus far 3 have responded favorably.

Goal No. 5 is taking place. Juris II had a great get-together in Wisconsin, put on by State Deputy Ken Hallgren with 6 clubs represented. Three clubs helped in the tremendous reactivation of the San Antonio Club. Juris III, the largest in membership, will probably have eight to ten clubs represented at its gathering in May. The Eastern part of Juris II is looking to Niagara for a six club gathering in June, while the clubs in Eastern Juris III are looking for their gathering of the clan in July. Southern California in Juris VI looks to its annual quad club meeting in August. They also met earlier this year at Coronado. The Western part of Canada in Juris V has rumors of a gathering this summer. So, if your club hasn't gotten together with a few of your neighboring clubs, get with the times. Contact your S-9 and tell him you want some help for a multi-club meeting.

Now we come to the good one! Goal No. 6 is to encourage more members to seek International office. After going up the chairs in a local club, most members kind of fade into the background. Too bad, because their experience and knowledge could be helpful to other clubs. More of these members should seek the office of Deputy Supreme Nine. He visits 2 or 3 nearby clubs and gives moral support and an exchange of ideas. This background prepares him for a 2 year seat on the Board as an S-9.

Air fares to two board meetings (one mid-year and one convention) are picked up by the International. He also receives .75 a year per each paid member in his Jurisdiction for expenses incurred within his jurisdiction promoting Hoo-Hoo. Employment involving travel is helpful but not necessary. WHAT IF WE HARVEST LIKE WE HARVEST TIMBER?

Consumers wouldn't stand for it. They would see that heads rolled in Washington.

Why, if we managed our agricultural crops as ineffectively as we manage our national forests, this country would no longer be the world's breadbasket.

Not by a long shot.
It's time we Americans asked our President, senators and congressmen, to take a look at the huge potential of our woodlands. We should point out that the economic and environmental benefits of the forest can be enjoyed at the same time without conflict.

It's time we said—look, there's over six billion board feet of timber going to rot out there every year.

We could take that material and build 400,000 new homes.

Create \$600,000,000 in local tax revenue.

If we got serious, we could make our national forests far more productive. Already private industry has shown how intensive forest management can double, in some cases even triple, the amount of wood grown on a piece of land.

What the Forest Service needs most is money—the funds to get the job done right. It's up to us to remind congress that every dollar invested in the Forest Service

yields a profit to the U.S. Treasury.

We must let it be known that
this country deserves a progressive National Forest Management
Act which will see to it that:

Timber production goals be established consistent with the nation's anticipated need and with

the capability of the national forests to meet that need.

2. Timber be sold in volumes sufficient to meet the established production goals.

Funds be provided for intensive management.

4. Over-age timber be harvested before it decays.





HAWAII'S FINE IN '79

Long before the history of mankind, eruptions under the Pacific Ocean poured hot lava in such quantity as to build a mountain chain rising as much as 14,000 feet above sea level. Each island differs from the other in geographic features, attractions and things to do.

Oahu The Aloha Isle

Third largest of the Hawaiian Islands and by far the most densely populated, the most famous, and the most frequently visited. Here you'll find Honolulu, largest city in the islands--the governmental, financial and educational center of the state. On the outskirts of Honolulu is Waikiki, the superresort full of activity and fun

from early morning till very late at night. Visitors love Oahu for its excitement and gaiety and its exoitic blend of American, Polynesian and Oriental cultures.

The Polynesian Cultural Center gives you the opportunity to see six native villages representative of those in Fiji, Tonga, New Zealand, Tahiti, Samoa and old Hawaii. There's informal entertainment, demonstrations of native arts and crafts in the making, buffet dining and a theatrical extravaganza featuring a cast of 120 Polynesians in song, dance and drama. Sea Life Park is great fun for everyone with shows featuring frolicking porpoises and leaping whales.

Maui The Valley Isle

About 20 minutes by air southeast of Oahu lies the beautiful island of Maui. It is actually two islands joined together by a fertile peninsula, where modern suburbs adjoin broad fields of waving sugar



It's also the location of the Hana resort district. Other Maui attractions include Iao Valley, the historic and picturesque whaling town of Lahaina and the fabulous Kaanapali and Wailea resort areas. Lahaina, Maui was the capital of the Hawaiian Kingdom until 1850 when King Kamehameha moved the capital to Honolulu.

Hawaii The Orchid Isle

Often called "The Big Island" Hawaii is the largest and southern-most island in the group. Here you may see, at close range and in perfect safety, intermittently active Kilauea Volcano, the chain of craters, lava tubes and tree fern forests which are part of Hawaii Volcanoes National Park. Proposed By-laws Changes

At the International Board of Directors Meeting in El Paso, Texas on January 20, 1979, the following was accomplished:

A motion was made, seconded and carried to change Article I of the Articles of Incorporation from "The name of this corporation shall be International Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo." to "INTERNATIONAL CONCATENATED ORDER OF HOO-HOO dba (doing business as) HOO-HOO INTERNATIONAL and-or INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF HOO-HOO

A motion was made, seconded and carried to eliminate the office of the International Second Vice President.

In accordance with Article XVIII of the International Bylaws, the paid membership in Hoo-Hoo International is notofied of the above proposed by-laws changes at least 60 days prior to the 1979 convention.

The Second Vice Presidency Should This Office Be Retained Or Eliminated?

In order to give this question full consideration, the pro's and con's concerning this question are herein presented for your consideration. Our Snark, a supporter of retaining this office, has written the pro side, while our secretary-treasurer, the proponent of eliminating this office, has written the con side

Statement For Having A Second Vice President

by Eugene D. Zanck

The need for a 2nd Vice President was proven recently by the death of Gordie Doman. Having served this Order as 2nd Vice President and 1st Vice President, I believe duties for these offices should be spelled out in more detail so the office holder can understand he is supposed to be working for the good of the Order. In addition to that, I believe both offices can be strengthened by equal division of responsibilities. This can be accomplished by assigning each Veep 4 North American jurisdictions. (Membership responsibility in Australia's Juris IV would remain under the Juris IV S-9.)

In addition to looking after his respective 4 jurisdictions, the Veep should also be given the assignment of reactivating or starting at least one club during his term of office. This would give the 2nd Veep experience in starting one club and the 1st Veep would have the experience of starting two clubs by the time he runs for Snark.

This experience, coupled with a first name working knowledge of people in 8 jurisdictions, will serve as a solid foundation for the Veep to become Snark. It will also further the cause of Hoo-Hoo, because it will guarantee us at least two new or reactivated clubs every year.

We presently give our 2nd Veep nothing for his Hoo-Hoo travels other than paying his air fare to 2 board meetings. On the other hand, we presently reimburse the 1st Veep for \$1500.00 worth of expenses in addition to paying his air fare to the two board meetings. This can be reduced to make this expense compensation more equitable by alloting

each Veep a fixed reimbursement for expenses, plus giving him a fixed dollar amount for each new member signed up within his respective 4 jurisdictions.

In other words, the incentive principal would apply-the better job he does, the more expense reimbursement money he receives. As an example, each Veep could receive a fixed expense amount of \$500.00 plus 75° for each new member signed up. These amounts can be determined by the Board of Directors and adjusted periodically according to need

This proposal is the first constructive approach we've taken towards increasing membership in our Order and needs your support.

The by-law change to eliminate the office of Second Vice President is a step backwards which reduces the opportunities for members to advance within our Order. If we are to retain the positive attitude to increase membership as we have been doing these last several years then we need to retain the office of Second Vice President. I urge your support to keep this office.

At the Hoo-Hoo International Convention in Honolulu, you will be asked to vote on a By-Law change to eliminate the office of Second Vice President.

In 1964 it was decided that any member wishing to become Snark would first run for the office of Vice President and if elected, then the following year he would run for the office of Snark, unopposed. Jimmy Carter Led Astray?

A Pacific Northwest forester said today that President Carter's forestry advisers are leading him away from his goals of reducing inflation and unemployment by instituting policies and practices which will create an artificial timber shortage.

Speaking at the Portland Chamber of Commerce Weekly Forum, W.D. Hagenstein, Executive Vice President, Industrial Forestry Association, said the Administrations forestry performance has been fraught with error and misjudgement and gave three examples.

Reforestation: Carter's 1980 national forest budget reduced reforestation funding by a third. When Western Congressmen expressed their shock and anger over such short-sighted budgeting, Asst. Secretary of Agriculture Rupert Cutler said they were raising a "phony issue," despite evidence that there is indeed more than a million acres of national forest land in need of reforestation.

"Secretary Cutler must know that if we don't get the new trees in the ground, we can't justify the harvest of old ones," Hagenstein declared

Reorganization: To make good on his campaign promise and justify the \$6½ million reorganization project, Carter plans to move the U.S. Forest Continued on Next Page

"Gaining support for such a transfer is going to require a lot better showing by the Carter Administration toward utilizing the productice capacity of the lands under its control," he said.

RARE II: This multi-million dollar study to determine which of the national forest roadless areas are suited for wilderness designation was completed in January with a Department of Agriculture recommendation for 15 million of the 62 million acres under study for wilderness, 11 million for further study and 36 million for multiple use. Now the Administration plans to increase its wilderness recommendation to Congress by half a million acres in Oregon alone.

"Carter's advisers must learn that 80 per cent of America's homes are built of wood and that building materials for one of every six American homes has come from Oregon in the last half-

WHY WORK?? NOMINATIONS!

Editor's note: This editorial appeared in a recent issue of a publication by the Roseburg Lumber Company, Roseburg, Oregon, and was written by that company's president, Kenneth W. Ford.

Due to America's misdirected welfare and tax laws, millions of this country's "poor" have little choice when they debate whether to join the productive workers or to remain in subsidized unemployment.

Two researchers at the University of Southern California, Arthur B. Laffer and Chris Petruzelli, have focused their studies on the typical member of the working poor: a married man with two children, living in Los Angeles, earning \$4,800 a year.

"This worker," says Laffer and Petruzelli, "would have \$810.48 in net spendable income from wages and government welfare benefits including such things as food stamps and housing assistance. Shockingly, the total would be only \$92.49 more than the family would receive if it wasn't earning a penny!

"But it gets worse. At the earned income level of \$4,800, every time he earns an additional dollar, he loses so many benefits that his real income increases by

only 5.2 cents. "And if you think that's bad, consider what would happen if he got a 50% raise to \$7,200 a year. His net monthly spenadble income would be down from \$810.49 to \$784.76. If, by some miracle, he doubled his earnings to \$9,600 a year, he'd really feel stupid - for his net family income would fall even farther to \$773.82. Indeed, at both these "higher" income levels, his combination of benefit losses and taxes would be more than 105 percent. Every dollar he earned would literally put him farther behind. Even if he really surged ahead and started earning \$12,000 a year, the monthly net, \$795.94, would be less than he had to spend with a \$4,800 income!"
